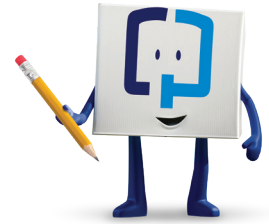


Hi there! Let's talk about the **Cologuard**® test

Questions to ask your healthcare provider

When thinking about your screening options, here are some **questions you can ask** your healthcare provider to help make the best decision:

- When am I due to screen for colon cancer? Should I screen right away?
- Everyone is either average risk or high risk for colon cancer (no one is “low risk”) — am I at average risk?
- Is the Cologuard test right for me?
- If I use the Cologuard test, how do I complete the test and how will I learn about the results?

When you're ready, let your healthcare provider know **why** you are interested in the Cologuard test.

- I want to screen for colon cancer as soon as I am due.
- I like that the Cologuard test is noninvasive, there's no prep, and I can collect a sample at home.
- I know the Cologuard test is effective — it can find 92% of colon cancers, even in early stages.

After the Cologuard test is ordered

Once your healthcare provider places the order, your Cologuard kit will be delivered to your home. When it arrives, check the expiration date, and use it as soon as possible. Place the kit in your bathroom so it's ready when you are.

Important Information about the Cologuard test

The Cologuard test is intended to screen adults 45 years of age and older who are at average risk for colorectal cancer by detecting certain DNA markers and blood in the stool. Do not use if you have had adenomas, have inflammatory bowel disease and certain hereditary syndromes, or a personal or family history of colorectal cancer. A Cologuard test is not a replacement for colonoscopy in high risk patients. Cologuard test performance in repeat testing has not been established.

The Cologuard test result should be interpreted with caution. A positive test result does not confirm the presence of cancer. Patients with a positive test result should be referred for colonoscopy. A negative test result does not confirm the absence of cancer. Patients with a negative test result should discuss with their doctor when they need to be tested again. False positives and false negative results can occur. Rx only.
